Parish Council News

Due to continuing advice from NALC (National Association of Local Councils), the Parish Council continue to hold meetings via Zoom.

Both our District and County Councillors were present having already provided reports on key issues. Cllr. Perteghella discussed the woodland area within Meon Vale, confirming a resident's association within MV will appoint a steering committee to focus on protecting this valuable asset. Marston Sicca Parish Council have already submitted a strong objection to the potential development of this area but in addition, are working with

the residents and the district councillor to raise the profile of the woodland area.

The issues relating to Unitary Authority was briefly mentioned; the Government is publishing a White Paper next month which would see the biggest reorganisation of local government in almost 50 years. Please see hwww.stratford.gov.uk/news/news.cfm/current/1/item/137297 for more information.

Councillors debated the ongoing discussions with Lagan Homes and our respective solicitors with regards to the transfer of the open space. We were pleased to receive confirmation from

SDC that Lagan had finally accepted our decision relating to the original plans for the site and that the transfer would now be organised through the normal legal channels. We had again found some delays relating to the legal under- taking but this too was likely to be resolved in the short term. With the transfer in mind, councillors were able to return their attention to the open space and its intended use. Once the transfer formalities are concluded, the open space steering committee can be reformed along with professional guidance to evaluate best options for the site.

With land being transferred to the Parish Council (including play area etc., within Barley Fields), councillors discussed a maintenance programme to ensure equipment and open space is regularly checked and/or enhanced. In addition, with specific reference to existing play areas, the council felt items of play within Barley Fields were inadequate and not reflective of wider age groups. Cllr. Hillier and Cllr. Clarke are reviewing space and options of further play schemes with the possibility of making some modifications to the area in order to introduce new, more versatile equipment.

With specific reference to Meon Vale, an update was given on the allotments; The lease has been approved but await the plans from St Modwen's solicitors, this has been chased with St Modwen directly. With regards to the Pavilion and the intention of running this as a community hub, the temporary license agreement between St Modwen and Marston Sicca Parish Council has now been received and the council will be reviewing terms of use and an operational framework. This is an enterprise being jointly managed with Quinton Parish Council and will involve a range of services to help support the wider Meon Vale community.



Report from your District Councillor

Dear Residents

I hope you are all keeping well. As I write this, sadly cases of Covid-19 infections are on the increase nationally, and therefore the government has just announced new restrictions including the 'rule of 6' in relation to gatherings. It will be also mandatory for certain businesses to have a system to collect NHS Test and Trace data, and keep this for 21 days. These new restrictions will be in place for some time, as we enter autumn, and with it the colder months. Please do all take care.

As I wrote in my previous report, I have proposed a motion related to planning in the last Council meeting, which asks that technical guidance notes are drawn and published for Class Q, which is a form of permitted development which allows the change of use of certain buildings from agriculture to residential use. The Cabinet has asked for a report to be produced by officers for consideration by the Overview and Scrutiny Committee, following which, to be reported back to the Cabinet.

The Annual (virtual) council Meeting, postponed from last May, happened on the 16th September. This is where membership of several committees is decided, with ward members nominated, appointed and if applicable voted in. The new Chairman of the Council is also elected. I will be sitting on the Audit and Standards committee, as well as the Climate Change Panel, and the Electoral boundary review working group.

Business Rates Grant Relief Scheme

The Council has paid the grant to nearly 3000 businesses in the District, under the Small Business Grant and the Retail, Leisure and Hospitality Grant Funds. The Business Rates Grant scheme ended on 28 August 2020.

Proposed Planning changes

One of the most important issues which will

affect our District in the years to come is the government's new planning proposals. The government is right now consulting on two proposals to completely reform the planning system. One is on current planning rules, and the other is on the future overhaul of the whole planning system. Under the proposed future reforms, land will be put into one of three categories or zones - for growth, for renewal or for protection. Planning permission would be automatically granted for developments in the 'growth' areas (subject to certain criteria).

A 'presumption in favour of development' will affect those areas under the 'Renewal' label, areas which therefore are suitable for some development. Development would be discouraged in the 'Protection' zones, such as national parks and areas of outstanding beauty. If these reforms get voted through, the local planning authorities would be asked to produce a new local development plan which must be in place within 30 months.

Policy would be set at national -rather than local – level. There are other issues in the proposals, including replacing the Community Infrastructure Levy and \$106 payments with a national levy, and a move towards a digital planning system. As you would imagine these plans have already caused some concern to various organisations.

As your ward member, I feel very strongly that we must ensure that any future change to the planning system puts local participation at its heart, and that communities continue to have the right to shape the future of their local areas.

The planning consultations are on the Ministry of Housing, Communities & Local Government website. The consultation on changes to the current planning system closes on 1st October, whilst the consultation on future reforms 'Planning for the future' closes on 29th October.

Site allocation Plan (SAP)

The Preferred Option of the SAP 2020 has been published and it will be presented to the Cabinet on the 5th October. You can read it online: www.stratford.gov.uk/planning-building/SAP-Preferred-Options-Cabinet-Version.cfm?frmAlias=/sappo/

Then, depending on Cabinet's decision, it will be presented to Full Council on 19th October.

After the Council's vote, it should be published for public consultation later in the autumn. Unfortunately, the site containing the Meon Vale woodland walk has been proposed for inclusion - not as a site held in reserve - but as allocated for housing development, under the label of 'Specific Site Proposal'. I have asked to speak at the Cabinet meeting, and I will speak at full Council, objecting to its inclusion. Once the SAP is due for public consultation, I will be able to submit my formal representation as ward member, and all residents and other stakeholders will be able to formally comment on the sites identified. I will work together with the residents and your Parish Council in my response.

Possible Future of the District Council

Following the government calls for council reorganisation in their forthcoming White Paper on the future of local government structure, and its preference for unitary authorities, Warwickshire County Council commissioned a report with options and on 27th August the report was presented to the WCC Cabinet. This report makes the case for a single unitary authority. This report is now published on the County Council website. This will be fully debated at the County Council meeting at the end of September.

The 5 District councils, including Stratford

District Council, have commissioned their own report to look at all the options, including two unitary councils (North Warwickshire and a separate South Warwickshire unitary). I will update you in the next issue about the findings of the Districts' report.

What your District Council provides:

Among the many services our local District Council provides, and its responsibilities, there are the following:

Housing services including homelessness function, Planning, including planning policy, Environmental Health, including food inspections and pest control, Housing Benefits and Council Tax, Electoral Services, Land Charges, Licensing, including Taxis.

By jointly working with other agencies, the Council also provides Business Rates administration, Parking Services, supports the Citizens Advice Bureau and the Voluntary Action Stratford on Avon (Vasa), and Tourism, with Shakespeare's England.

Provided by Third Parties: Leisure Centres, Refuse and Recycling services, Grounds Maintenance, including grass cutting on council land, Street Cleaning services, public toilets.

Seasonal Recipes

Pumpkin And Ginger Soup

Ingredients

- 1kg scooped out pumpkin from your little darlings' beautifully-carved masterpiece(!)
- 2 shallots
- 75g ginger
- Some fresh herbs, like chives, mint
- Extra virgin olive oil
- 1 litre vegetable stock
- 125ml coconut milk, plus extra to serve
- ½ tablespoons chilli powder
- 1 lime

Method

- 1 Roughly chop pumpkin, peel and chop shallots, peel and finely grate the ginger, and finely chop the herbs.
- 2 Put the pumpkin, shallots, ginger and some oil in a large pot and sauté until soft.
- 3 Add the stock, coconut milk and chilli powder. Season, then bring to the boil and simmer for 40 minutes.
- 4 Blitz in a food processor then serve with fresh herbs, juice of a lime and a splash of coconut milk. Yum.

Fun fact (from National Trust)

Most of us know that pumpkins are of the same family as the squash, but so are cucumbers and melons.

The largest pumpkin ever grown weighed in at a massive 2,625lbs (1,190.68kg)!!

Squash are technically a fruit, but definitely taste better as a soup than served with ice cream or custard!

Antarctica is the only continent where pumpkins can't grow.

Kids Fave: Butternut and Tomato Pasta

Ingredients

- 1 butternut squash
- Olive oil
- Sundried tomato paste (good few spoonfuls), or sundried tomatoes
- Herbs of your choice thyme is fab, or good old dried mixed herbs
- Parmesan or other cheese alternative
- Pasta of choice

Method

Preheat oven to 180°. Cut butternut squash into half, place on baking tray, season, drizzle with olive oil and roast

- for roughly half an hour. Depends on size.
- 2 About ten minutes before butternut squash is cooked place pan of water to boil. Pop in pasta of choice.
- 3 Take squash out of oven and scoop out of skin. Place squash and paste, or sundried tomatoes into a food processor and whizz into a nice sauce.
- **4** Drain pasta and mix together (pasta to sauce), season to taste.
- **5** Scatter over parmesan or even just grated cheese.

ONE FOR THE GROWN UPS

The hedges are dripping with sloes this year. Like dripping...... however please stick to footpaths, and be careful if picking along the side of the road (from experience)!

For the best flavour you should wait until berries are ripe. They should be a dark rich purple and should squash easily between your fingertips.

Tradition was that you should pick after the first frost. I like tradition, but unfortunately the weather is changing, and they look very ripe at the moment. Nowadays we can trick the berries and pop them in the freezer to mimic the first frost.

The theory is the frost splits the skin so the juices flow into the gin without the effort of pricking all the berries.

Sloe Gin

Ingredients

- 1 litre bottle of gin
- 450g sloes
- 225g caster sugar
- 1 large sterilised jar or 2 empty litre bottles.

Method


- Wash sloes and seal in an airtight bag. Freeze overnight or until you're ready to make the gin.
- 2 Put frozen sloes into sterilised jar or bottles.
- 3 Add gin then the sugar directly onto frozen sloes. Their skins will split which means you avoid pricking.
- 4 Once the sloes have thawed, seal the jar tightly and shake.
- 5 Store jar in a cool, dark place and shake every other day for a week. After the first week you only need to shake it once a week for 2 months.

6 The liquid should now be dark red and ready for drinking, though it improves over time.

Serve neat with ice, or drizzle over ice cream.

To make a Sloe Royale (oooh nice wee Christmas cocktail), add to champagne (sacrilege personally), or a sparkling wine.





This is George - Not your usual tortoise!

He's a Sulcata (African Spur Thigh).

He's the third largest tortoise species, after the Galapagos and the Aldabra.

He is 6 years old, just a baby by Sulcata standards

The oldest Sulcata on record is 189 years old so he's more than a lifetime commitment. We anticipate that the next 6/7 generations will be looking after him.

He has his own insulated summerhouse with a temperature of 23° day and night, winter and summer.

His basking lamp reached 32° for his daytime sunbathing.

He likes to dig a burrow at night so at least 30cm of soil on the floor.

He's a giant, already too heavy to lift, so his enclosure has to be secure with a large grazing area and a shallow pool. (He enjoys bathing on hot days).

We learned very quickly (after he pulled the door off the summerhouse) that he acts like a tank. Goes through obstacles instead of round them.

Aside from grass, his favourite treats are dandelions, plantain, mallow and romaine lettuce. Every morning I can be seen foraging for his food along the Greenway.

Eats like a horse, poos like a horse, but would I swap him??

Leopard Tortoises

A few facts about Leopard Tortoises Their origin: Africa.

They are the fourth largest tortoises in the world and can weigh up to 54kg.

What they eat: Grass, Kale, spring greens, rose and hibiscus leaves, romaine lettuce and many dandelions which is their favourite. They also need calcium, which they have in powder form or a cuttlefish.

- They do not hibernate.
- They can live up to 75 years.
- They are the only tortoises that can swim and they can stay underwater for 10 minutes.
- When they are scared or stressed, they hiss.
- Female lays eggs, incubation 9 to 12 months, varying according to temperature and location.
- They can lay between 5 to 30 eggs depending on their size. they bury their eggs in the sand.
- They must be inside when the temperature is below 15 degrees Celsius

St James the Great

Ramblings from the Rector!

Some years ago we used to sing a children's action chorus that went like this: 'I'm going to zoom, zoom, zoom, around the room, room, room, and praise the Lord. I'm going to tell of all he's done, I'm going to make him number one, I'm going to zoom around the room and praise the Lord'

You can perhaps imagine the actions that went with that song, but who would have thought that as a church we would be 'zooming' as we moved our church services online*. In all honesty, it's not been easy at times to 'praise the Lord' but I trust that through the present pandemic, God has walked with you, encouraging and supporting you as you put your hand in his.

In August we were finally allowed back in to our beautiful church buildings for worship. Of course services are now very different - for the time being we have to sit at a physical distance from each other, we can't greet each other with a handshake or a hug, some of our church family can't be with us due to the ongoing health concerns around COVID-19 and we are unable to sing - although we can listen to music. Despite all that, for many it's a great relief to be back - to see each other face to face, rather than on a computer screen - even though we now have to wear a face covering!

For a moment, I want to think about 'face coverings' – the latest fashion accessory! There are so many different types: pleated, fitted, stretchy, floral, plain, homemade, bought, disposable.... I wonder what your favourite type is?

What they all have in common is that they cover the face, or certainly the lower part of the face – which can be difficult as we try to communicate with or recognise



people we've not seen for a while.
Thankfully we can say a lot with our eyes, which help our muffled voices to be heard.
You may even find a bit of 'sign language' creeping into our services as we attempt to share our welcome with each other.

Sadly we sometimes try and hide behind face coverings – be they actual physical coverings, or virtual coverings of our own making.

Interestingly the Bible has quite a bit to say about faces. In Numbers 6.26 we have that famous verse now made into a beautiful blessing: 'May the Lord make his face to shine upon you and give you his peace'. In 1 Samuel 16.7 we read 'man looks on the outward appearance, but the Lord looks on the heart'. Life is not about what people see on the outside – it's about what God, our loving heavenly Father, sees on the inside and he longs to give us his peace.

In Exodus 34.33-35 we read about how Moses wore a 'veil' over his face when he met with God. When he returned to the people, he removed his veil and guess what - his face was radiant! Not surprisingly, meeting with God had made a massive difference to his face, to his outward appearance.

The New Testament makes frequent reference to seeking God's 'face' – or in other words 'his presence'. The New Testament also talks of 'God revealing his face to us in human form, displayed in the face of Jesus Christ'. You can read about that in 2 Corinthians 4.6.

There are many other references to faces in the Bible which all remind us that God is interested in us as real people: God has a name, and he calls us by our name; God is a person, and he is concerned about us as a person; God has a face, and he seeks our face (our true face); God has a heart, and he seeks our heart!

Face coverings have become the norm – but may I suggest we don't just have to wear them when we're put and about – we can use them as a prayer prompt:

- as you put it on, remember that God is concerned about you as an individual and can see through your face covering whether it's a literal one or a virtual barrier of our own making.
- Perhaps take the opportunity each day

Ordination of Revd Jim Edie as Priest in the Church of England

On Sunday 20th September, Jim was 'ordained' as a Priest in the Church of England in a beautiful (but rather different than normal) service at Gloucester Cathedral by Bishop Rachel. His ordination had been delayed from June because of the current pandemic.

You might well be saying – I already thought he was ordained – he wears a dog collar and looks like a Priest!

Indeed, he does, but in the Church of England, a Priest has to first be ordained as a 'Deacon' before being ordained as a Priest. The only visible difference is perhaps in the way he wears his 'stole'. The observant amongst you will have seen that he used to wear it diagonally across his



body – as a symbolic nod to the wearing of a towel by Jesus as he washed his disciples' feet – and is a sign of the servant nature of the deacon role. In addition, Jim can now preside at a Service of Holy Communion, marry and 'bless' people.

Many books have been written about what

the life and work of being a Priest is all about. Priests come in very many different 'varieties' with different priorities and in different contexts. One Bishop summarised the role as being concerned with the glory of God, the pain of the world and the renewal (repentance) of the Church.

Bishop John Pritchard described the role of the Priest as: presiding genius, spiritual explorer, artful story teller, multilingual interpreter, inquisitive learner, pain bearer,

wounded companion, weather-beaten witness, iconic presence, friendly irritant, creative leader, attractive witness, faith coach, mature risk taker, flower arranger and life-fulfiller. As ministry has changed rapidly over 2020, perhaps we can add to that list - technical guru, social media influencer, infection control officer, Government guidance interpreter.....

When you next meet Jim, ask him which of these roles he particularly relates to!

We work extremely hard to keep prices competitive (in some cases like Cotswold Gin, being the cheapest in the area), and keep a wide range of products stocked. We try to source many of our products such as bread, cakes, milk, bacon, eggs, honey, beer etc locally. Le Petit Croissant is an

example. During lockdown we have been placing daily orders, which has proved very popular. They have proved to be extremely reliable during this difficult time, whilst still keeping their pricing reasonable. They supply fresh baked rolls, ciabatta baps and baquettes. They also supply artisan bread with flavours like sundried tomato and olive, stilton, onion and sourdough. Meon Vale Resident's Meeting

I'm so pleased to share with you the outcome of resident's meeting on Wednesday 16th. The meeting was held via Zoom (on-line video conferencing) and had a fantastic turnout. Thanks to everyone for attending and particularly Dominic Skinner for Chairing and Natasha for taking minutes.

We talked about the various issues and opportunities we have as residents in Meon Vale – and being such a new village and a young community with a wide demographic (when compared to other villages in south Warwickshire), it is apparent that we have a wealth of assets, facilities, ideas, skills and experience to draw upon.

So the plan is to set up a steering group to determine exactly how a formal group can be established. The steering group will meet and prepare the groundwork so that the next resident's meeting will be to agree a constitution, elect officers, consider funding, routes of communication, open up membership and establish subgroups who will have specific tasks or areas of interest. If you want to get involved or just to know more, please email meonvaleresidents@ gmail.com. Please feel free to tell us your thoughts and share your ideas - to be effective, the resident's group needs to be open and accessible to everyone so that it is representative of as many residents as possible.

In the meantime, we have the very urgent matter of our much-loved woodland (part of the Greenway Walk) which is currently facing the threat of future development. Contact Alisha Johnson via meonvaleresidents@gmail.com to see how you can get involved. Please also checkout the Facebook group "Friends of Meon Vale Woodland Walk" where you can share your thoughts, observations, videos and photos

of the woodland. Lots of people from the surrounding villages use the woodlands, so this group is open to anyone and everyone who appreciates this special place.

All residents should have recently received the September Meon Vale Newsletter from St Modwen. This has several interesting articles, including a link to a survey so you can let them know your views. There is also information about the Meon Vale Management Company which manages many of the assets and communal areas of our village. Most residents are already members of the Meon Vale Management Company and St Modwen wish to establish a Resident's Working Group Forum. We need to work out how our new resident's group will link into this.

I think the Spring Lockdown made many of us acutely aware of how important our neighbours and immediate surroundings are: I certainly discovered more about my community and beautiful surroundings. And it certainly made clear to me that we can't take these things for granted. In fact, several schemes and initiatives were set up during lockdown including the local volunteer support networks and the food bank. Other groups have been working hard on resident's behalf to open up the allotments and reopen the Sports Pavilion. I think it is great that these things are already happening although it is a shame that they are needed. I hope we can support these initiatives and ensure they are accessible to everyone.

Thoughts on Meon Vale Woodlands

I really do appreciate the beautiful surroundings of where I live. It's the main reason we moved to Meon Vale: trees, hills, great amenities and access to open space. Daily walks are part of my regime to maintain physical and mental health and most days I follow the greenway from my

house and then onto the woodland walk. Every time I go, I see others doing the same: families, dog walkers, joggers or others like me simply stretching their legs, enjoying the air, the birdsong, the smell of the pines and the changing light through the trees. The woodland is such a delightful place and people from surrounding villages also regularly use it too.

So, I am appalled at the prospect of the woods being felled to accommodate future housing development. If it is taken it away, we will lose a valuable local community resource. I will have to travel by car to Mickleton (Bakers Hill) or The Heart of England Forest at Barton to enjoy a similar woodland experience. But then I won't happen upon my friends and neighbours, so there will be no stopping for a quick hello and a chat. In order to reduce my carbon footprint I try to avoid using a car, so inevitably, I will go out less often and to the detriment of my physical and mental health.

One aspect I find very difficult to understand is how a local authority would ever consider the destruction of, or even a reduction of an established woodland. On 15th July 2019, Stratford-on-Avon District Council declared a Climate Emergency with councillors pledging to take local action to contribute to national targets to reduce carbon.

The council declared their aim for the district to be carbon neutral by 2030 and stated that they would, amongst other things, engage residents on the severity of climate change, examine how policy proposals will consider climate change and look at the effectiveness of their current activities to combat climate change. So how can Stratford on Avon District Council support any future development upon woodland and still stand by this declaration? How can planning officers even be contemplating this as a reasonable option?

Trees act as carbon sinks by absorbing

atmospheric carbon. Trees prevent and reduce flooding and trees reduce pollution. The entire ecosystems of woodlands help to absorb carbon and it takes years for woodland ecosystems to develop. We need to be planting many more trees, not cutting them down. Only 13% of the UK's land area is covered by trees compared with an EU average of 37% (Woodland Trust). UK needs to plant 1.5billion trees to tackle climate change (The Committee on Climate Change, 2019).

St Modwen is suggesting they fell more than 9 acres of established mature trees and woodland habitat because "there are no overriding physical, environmental or technical constraints to development". St Modwen seemingly does not agree that trees are an effective way to tackle the climate crisis. More worrying is that neither do Stratford-upon-Avon District Council.

St Modwen states "We turn spaces into places that allow generations of people, communities and business to thrive" and "we make long standing commitments" (https://stmodwenhomes.co.uk/why-st-modwen/creating-better-futures/). Meon Vale is a fabulous place and I commend them for the master planning of the development that has been delivered so far.

However, the proposal flies in the face of this. St Modwen has taken no account of the impact of the substantial loss of existing amenity to the existing users of the woodland – there has been no consultation with the community and there has been no transparency with residents about their plans. The intrinsic value of the woodland to our community is not being considered by St Modwen, although they continue to use the woodland as a selling point to entice prospective house buyers. Where is St Modwen's commitment to the existing community there?

I understand the need to build more houses.

So yes, build more houses, expand Meon Vale if necessary (it's a great place to live and already is expected to significantly grow with phase 4) - there is plenty of suitable land around our village for it to grow. But I can see only one possible reason why an established and well-loved accessible woodland is an appropriate place to build more houses. That is because St Modwen already owns the land and stand to make a profit. But at a huge cost to the rest of us.
